there was a very interesting editorial in one of our local papers recently by George will. He talks mostly about promises that have been made and never carried out for example Pres. Obama said almost 3 years ago that the time has come for president aside in Syria to step aside. Today, James Clapper, director of national intelligence, says Pres. Asad's grip on power has strengthened. Mr. will goes on to say that in the president's State of the Union address in January he defined success by changing the subject by saying the threat of force is why Syria's chemical weapons are being eliminated. This presidency illustrates the perils of government run by believing in magic words and numbers.
