Growing up in the fifties, in my blue collar family, having and keeping a job that could feed and shelter a family was as much as my parents could expect or strive for. My dad had a fourth grade education which limited his opportunities. But, he was hard working and loyal which served him well in the work place. We worked for 18 months on the trail, mostly on week ends. The city provided tools and secured donations of woodchips and gravel. Faculty provided advice and guidance. It was an amazing experience.

In 1984, around the time that I was Mayor, my idea of community service consisted of volunteering my professional skills to the planning commission and running for and winning a seat on the council. Then I was asked if I was interested in joining Rotary. To be honest, I couldn't see it. My image of Rotary was that of a bunch of aging business owners having lunch together and playing golf. But the late Gerry Hansen invited me to lunch. My view was correct at first glance. But then I learned the depth of their commitment to this community and the world around us. I was truly impressed. I am thirty years into this global organization and am still surprised and impressed by all the good works that Rotary does.

Rotary is not the only service club. There are many opportunities to give back. And the friends you make are priceless: We have come a long way in the simple awareness of the opportunities for helping make our community and our world a better place.
