Over half said he was unfit but Goldwater sued the magazine and won. The APA found "it is unethical for a psychiatrist to offer a professional opinion on a person in the public limelight unless he or she has conducted an examination and has been granted proper authorization for such a statement."

But I am no psychiatrist. I'm just a guy with 3 minutes of air time and here is some information about narcissists.

Dr. Joseph Brugo wrote the book "The Narcissist You Know" and he says narcissists are "compelled to talk about themselves and exaggerate their accomplishments."

He says they are hyper competitive and their accomplishments have to be the biggest and the best. Their crowd was the largest. Their victory margin the widest. And they hang on to these opinions despite evidence to the contrary.

Brugo says narcissists hold grudges when they are criticized, even though they look confident on the outside. Even a small criticism can cause a narcissist to seek revenge. Do you try to admit when you are wrong? Narcissists don't. They find someone to blame and refuse to be held accountable.
