A Stable Government

The same is true of programs that are not structural but provide services to the public. Think of such programs as social security or medicare or veterans services. These services are enacted because they are needed and successful because the public wants them to continue.

Most people, when they enter a public service position understand their position on various issues and these issues affect structural or social programs. Most office holders will study the affect of proposing a new law and the consequences on existing programs. Most realize you can't just stop a sewer system to do something different with out providing for some time to phase out one system while another is developed.

This is also true of social programs. The DACA program is a good example of this. By executive order, President Obama begin a program protecting children of undocumented immigrants from being targeted for deportation. There are about 800 thousand such children that signed up with the government under this promise. No law suites were served so this is the law of the land until challenged and changed in court. As of Tuesday, we the people thru our government have broken this promise. We know that most of these young adults are in school, the military, or working legally. We know who they are because they signed up for the program. This make them especially vulnerable.
