But my parents go back with Pearl Harbor and my dad enlisting. My mother being a telegraph operator. Seven days a week working um through the war and married, um, when my dad came back from the war.

Many people take for granted what they receive from their parents. Being adopted I've always been very grateful for what I was able to get.

Working was expected. I started working after school when I was 14 years of age. That was just what you did. It was part of how I was raised. ah Going to church, giving back. Trying to do things in the community formed in part how I've approached life and how, I made my choices in what I was going to do for a living. Those too were a part of how I was raised. I was a lucky young man in my estimation. I would hear complaints from others I'd reach back because my parents never hid from me that I was adopted and I would think. How fortunate I was that I had parents who chose me, who loved me. I did a video for ah Foster Parents about this very same issue.

My issue what I want to say today to you is,

Love those you are close to. Love them because we never know how long we're going to have and when we'll lose them
