This is not an easy project—it is a tedious project. One where people can get easily bored. And miscalculate how much effort it would take to complete. And it seems like that's what happened. And only a few were finished.

We put out the best ones, leaving many in storage, but even the "best" ones were not in great shape. We received calls from people who were rightfully upset at the condition of the cut-outs.

So the Chamber had to make a decision about the cutouts and future boulevard decorations. The Board decided the best option was to wrap the trees on the boulevard with white lights—a look I am partial to because of my past traditions.

What about the cut-outs? We will make them available at no cost to Fortuna residents who would like to lovingly restore them and display them at their own home during the holidays.

That way, when you drive through the neighborhoods looking at Christmas decorations you will every so often see a blast from the past—holiday cut-outs that used to line the boulevard in December.

We know that many people love those cut-outs and look forward to seeing them each year. We also know that losing traditions doesn't feel good. Our hope is that the lights will be the start of a new December tradition that people will grow to love.

We will keep you posted on the process of picking up a cutout from the Chamber.
