This is the dawning of the Age of Aquarius.....

.....now that recreational cannabis is legal in California. We will all get a front row seat on the benefits, the problems and the changes for society. I drove by the dispensary in Old Town Eureka last week and there was an enthusiastic line of adults down the street.

California was the fifth state to legalize recreational cannabis and now many more states are considering it. This makes California the largest legal marijuana market in the nation. The Federal government still wants to outlaw it but that stance is not supported by public opinion.

<u>Business Insider</u> predicts that cannabis sales will hit 4 billion dollars this year and go over 5 billion next year. By comparison, California's beer sales are at 5 billion annually. California will have a fifteen per cent tax and cities and counties can tax on top of that. So we will have a new revenue source and new regulatory and enforcement responsibilities to pay for as well.

I have read many comments online from people associated with "THE INDUSTRY", as they call themselves. Many are complaining that taxes and regulations will cut into their lucrative profits. Let me pause and wipe away an imaginary tear. The Industry has been untaxed for too long and it is time to join the rest of us, filling out confusing forms and bitching about taxes and bureaucrats.

Most of my concern about marijuana has been the negative effects of the illegal production and black market sales. Legalization should improve that but it will not eliminate it.
