- + Explore tax incentives for landlords to upgrade their buildings, including such improvements as removing alcove overhangs and tax deferment incentives for adding privately funded security cameras and fencing.
- + Our Eureka Police Department still has several empty positions on it's roster, this is causing the city to pay expensive overtime costs while adding an unfair burden to our police officers. We've tried sign-on bonuses, but it's not the money that's the problem. A change in City Council leadership might be enough to encourage aspiring officers to choose Eureka as their place to work.

- + Recognize the determined efforts of our local charities and clean-up groups like Pacific Outfitters who are working hard to clean our streets of bio-hazardous needles and other debris. The City has a responsibly to maintain safe parks and streets. I've spoken to many parents who don't feel safe letting their children go out and play!
- + Demand that Humboldt County and Sacramento do their part to help Eureka fight crime and reduce the number of criminal drug addicts roaming our streets. While the city is often the victim of bad state policy, engaged local leadership can get a lot accomplished!
