He said tell me about it; his art, which is creative and beautiful requires a huge amount of tedious work to complete.

I think there is value in tedious activity. Even though it is mostly unavoidable in most work or activity, it is often that willingness to accept the tedium that is necessary to complete a project that sets it apart from others. I've known many people in my life that are simply unable to get their head in to tedious or repetitious actions and get board. I've heard some call tedious activity mind numbing and unpleasant. But accepting this level of detail often leads to a more successful outcome.

I make this point to suggest that tedium is not just a part of physical activities. A scientist will do endless observations and multiple repeats of the same test just to try to verify a theory or prove a conclusion. Just look at how long it takes to get a new life saving medicine on the market for general use.

It is even the same for politicians. You know the saying "the devil is in the details"? Like the artist, picking the subject is one thing; painting the picture is the hard part.

This week your President met with the dictator of North Korea. Before the meeting, he was asked about his preparation. He said he really didn't need to do any because it was mostly about attitude. Since the meeting we have heard how great the meeting was and what a great guy this fellow is. Really? This is the guy who imprisons thousands of his own people.
