in 1982 I was the campaign chairman in Humboldt County for George Deukmejian who was running for governor of the state of California. I got to know George Deukmejian on a personal basis and he was truly a great servant for us citizens of this great state of California.

He was the 35th Gov. of the state and he served from 1982 to 1986 and prior to that he served in the state assembly the California Senate and served two terms as attorney general.

In a recent article of the criminal Justice legal foundation a full-page was spent on the service of George Deukmejian. Unfortunately he died on June 8 of natural causes at the age of 89.
